Research Interests:

The majority of Professor Marsh's research publications deal with the assessment of the psychosocial consequences of traumatic injuries or chronic illness, for both the individual and their familial caregivers. He has conducted research across the life span with published studies on age groups ranging from infants to older adults. He has also published studies on non-clinical groups, primarily in the area of organisational psychology. His most cited studies are on the long-term outcomes of traumatic brain injury and the effects of these outcomes on family functioning.

Professor Marsh has previously been awarded grants to conduct research on traumatic brain injury, quality of life in dialysis patients, dementia in older adults, resilience in very low income families, and internet use amongst young adults. He has served as a consultant in the areas of occupational health, genetics, and rehabilitation.
