## **NURTURING 21ST CENTURY** DESIGN-ENTREPRENEURS

his August, the Department of Art & Design will launch two new degree programmes - the BA (Hons) Design Communication and BA (Hons) in Interior Architecture.

The BA (Hons) Design Communication is a three year programme that aims to nurture passionate, creative thinkers who have a good understanding of key communication and information design concepts, as well as acquire new skills that focus on cutting edge ideation, technology, software and digital media in design.

The BA (Hons) in Interior Architecture is a three-and-a-halfyear degree programme with an additional six months for industry placement. Governed by the Board of Architect Malaysia (LAM), the programme aims to provide the student with a good knowledge of ergonomics, sustainable design, technology-enhanced design, as well as social and economic issues in spatial design.

The Department of Art & Design transformed its curriculum as part of its initiative to give design education an entrepreneurial focus. The entrepreneurship initiative started in 2015, provides a platform for students to turn an idea into a product or service in an expert-led, sandbox environment.

These two new programmes in the School of Arts emphasise skills necessary for a 21st century design entrepreneur to leverage multidisciplinary modules such as design enterprise, computing, design for society and sustainable design.



## DR CHANNEENEE: THE MODERN LECTURER

he 2016 United States presidential campaign, and subsequent election victory, of Donald J. Trump have infuriated, disappointed, and energised many around the world, but it gave Dr Chan Nee Nee plenty of materials for her communication subjects.

"I use a lot of Trump examples because all our topics of conversation revolve around him today," Chan said with a mischievous smile. "One of the projects that I'm supervising now is on memes about Trump."

There was the one of a picture of Ivanka Trump, wearing a USD 4,000 silver dress on the night the travel ban was issued, juxtaposed against the picture of a young refugee girl wrapped in an emergency blanket. Another favourite reference of Chan is Trump's now infamous, aggressive handshakes, which were also widely ridiculed by netizens.

#### BORN IN MALACCA; PROFESSIONALLY TRAINED IN SINGAPORE

Chan grew up in Malacca and attended the Convent of Holy Infant Jesus. After completing her secondary school, she had two scholarship offers - one to pursue law at a local university, and the other for a Bachelor of Arts degree, in English literature and history at the National University of Singapore.

"I come from a poor family," said Chan, who as the eldest sibling believed that the financial circumstances of her family drove her to do well in her studies. "I felt that the scholarship from the Government of Singapore was very good and came at the right time, so that's why I chose to go over."

The price of that scholarship was to serve in the island republic for eight years.

Upon graduation, Chan started her career at Raffles Institution, an elite boy's secondary school that grooms future Singaporean leaders. It counts two of the three Singaporean Prime Ministers among its alumni, among others.

After Raffles came stints at the Chinese High School and Singapore Polytechnic, where she rose to the position of deputy director at the Department of Language and Communications, spending almost three decades in the republic building a career, and raising a family, before deciding it was time to come home.

"My husband and I feel that we are still Malaysians. We were permanent residents and never truly became Singaporeans." Chan said. "But I will always be very grateful that the country gave me a good living and a good education."





#### A CALLING SHE GREW INTO

Despite all that she has achieved in her career, teaching did not come natural to her. It was also not her first choice of vocation.

"I grew to love teaching, but law was my initial aspiration," Chan said of what might have been had she accepted the other scholarship offered to her, but she has no regrets. "

Chan remembers being struck by the message of an advertisement campaign during her time in Singapore, where she saw a billboard that says 'Teaching Changes Lives.' She reiterated that it is important for teachers to show a kind act or utter a kind word, which can mean a lot to students who are struggling personally or academically.

"I remember this student of mine who was struggling with his father and he was having a bad time," Chan said. "And it was just because of some words I said in the journals that he wrote that actually gave him support, and he remembers me up to today."





#### WHAT DO YOU EXPECT FROM A **UNIVERSITY?**

Chan's responsibilities as the head of a department include doing research, managing departmental events, as well as contributing to branding and marketing of the Department in order to get the university noticed across the country.

Among the subjects that Chan teaches at Sunway University are 'Celebrity Culture' and 'Psychology in Communication.'

She has to adapt to the shorter attention spans she noticed among students, and how they are becoming more kinesthetic, where one learns by doing.

"The changing role of teachers is very important to acknowledge," Chan said. "For example, if you have a good student, he or she will sometime know more than you, so as a teacher you have to learn to facilitate."

To make her point, she will always pose the same question to her students at the start of each semester: What do you expect from a university?

The usual reply from students will be to learn, to get a degree, to get a job and Chan will rebut with a calm and assuring voice,

"We teach you how to think."



## AS GOOD AS YOUR IMAGINATION

ngaging in coordinated movements with each other has been shown to have a whole host of social effects, and a new research by Dr Liam Cross from the University of Buckingham and Gray Atherton from the University of Houston investigates how imagining coordinating movements can affect our social behaviours and relationships.

Dr Cross and Atherton, who recently joined Sunway University's Department of Psychology as Visiting Research Fellows, wanted to ascertain whether imagining walking in synchrony with other people would lead to greater cooperation or cohesion, an effect that has been shown to follow actual synchronised walking.

Initial data collected in England suggested that imagined coordination is capable of increasing cohesion between actors, compared to imagined solitary walking. Whether it also affects cooperation was unclear.

It is established that imagining doing things can have similar consequences as actually doing them. For example, imagining practising tennis or darts can improve one's performances. Likewise for students, imagining revising for or taking a test has also been shown to improve test performances.

A larger-scale study has been completed on over 350 people at Sunway University in order to verify these results. Students from the Department of Psychology who participated in the study had the opportunity to observe, learn and gain a better understanding on experimental research methodology.

This work will be presented at the Rhythm Production and Perception Workshop later this year in the UK, and will be published in a peer-reviewed publication. B

# SUNWAY UNIVERSITY CELEBRATES FIRST COHORT OF MBA GRADUATES





he first graduating class of the Sunway University Master of Business Administration (MBA) celebrated with smiles, hugs and happy families at the MBA Presentation Ceremony and Alumni Gathering. ## HARVARD FORUM ON EDUCATION HELD FOR THE FIRST TIME IN MALAYSIA

his year's Asia Public Policy Forum (APPF) of the Ash Centre on Democratic Governance and Innovation at Harvard University was held in Malaysia for the first time in collaboration with the Jeffrey Cheah Institute on Southeast Asia (JCI) at Sunway University. The forum, which took place from 18 to 19 January, brought together government officials, academic, and private sector leaders to address the critical and complex policy challenges for education in Southeast Asia.

In his welcome address to the more than three hundred attendees, Harvard University's Professor Anthony Saich said the forum is "turning to the second key factor around human capital and development, which is the challenges in education provision."

Professor Saich cited the "The Growth Report" of the Commission of Growth and Development, which pointed out that growth strategies could not succeed without a commitment to equality of opportunity, with respect to education, especially for girls.

The six panel sessions were on "Creating a Vibrant Knowledge Sector"; "Balancing Access and Quality in Primary and Secondary Education"; "Balancing Access and Quality in Tertiary Education"; "Assessing and Improving Education

Quality"; "Meeting Job Market Demand and Understanding the Relationship Between Education and Development".

Delegates from the Malaysian Ministry of Higher Education, the Indonesian Ministry of Finance, Harvard University, Sunway University, University of Indonesia, Fudan University, Thailand Development Research Institute, University of Malaya, Vietnamese Academy of Social Sciences, and Myanmar National Education Policy Commission, among others, were in attendance.

During the conference dinner on January 18th, Dato' Seri Haji Idris bin Jusoh, the Minister of Higher Education, delivered a report on Malaysia's progress in developing its higher education sector.





### SUNWAY UNIVERSITY HONOURS SIR CHRISTIAN BONINGTON

ir Christian John Storey Bonington CVO, CBE was awarded the Doctor of Laws honoris causa at a special ceremony recently. The award was bestowed in recognition of his distinction as one of the greatest mountaineers of all time, and of his outstanding contribution as former Chancellor of Lancaster University to the development of higher education in Malaysia through his support for the close partnership between Lancaster University and Sunway University.

Sir Christian's association with Sunway University began in 2005 when he succeeded Her Royal Highness Princess Alexandra as Chancellor of Lancaster University. The following year an agreement was signed between Sunway University and Lancaster University where students who successfully completed their course of study for degrees at Sunway University in the fields of Arts, Business, Science and Technology will be awarded scrolls from both institutions

During the ceremony, Sir Christian shared on his journey from his education at the University College School in Hampstead, the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst in Surrey, his service in the army, his time at the Army Outward Bound School as a mountaineering instructor, and his career as professional mountaineer and explorer.

Presiding over the ceremony was Sunway University Chancellor, Tan Sri Dr Jeffrey Cheah Ao. The Sunway University Senate Members led by Professor Graeme Wilkinson, Vice-Chancellor; Tan Sri Dr Ramon Navaratnam, Pro-Chancellor; Professor Jarlath Ronayne, Tan Sri Jeffrey Cheah Distinguished Professor; Dr Lee Weng Keng, CEO, Education and Healthcare Division, Sunway Group; Puan Sri Dr Susan Cheah, EXCO member of Sunway Group; and Professor William James, Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Planning and Resources) of University of Oxford were also present to witness the ceremony.

Sir Christian has written 19 books. The first, "I Chose to Climb," is an autobiography written in 1966, reflecting on his decision to choose between his management career or concentrate on mountaineering. He is a leading member of a small group of British mountaineers, active in the second half of the 20th century, whose exploits are legendary. He has been on 19 Himalayan expeditions including four to Mount Everest.

Sir Christian was appointed Commander of the British Empire (CBE) in 1976, knighted by Queen Elizabeth II for services to mountaineering in 1996, and became a Commander of the Victorian Order (CVO) in 2010, for personal service to the Sovereign. B

## **ASEAN MINISTERS** CONVENE AT SUNWAY UNIVERSITY

n April, the first workshop of its kind, the ASEAN Ministers' Workshop (AMW) had brought together government representatives and economists specialising in sustainable development from the ASEAN region and Australia. The gathering was organised by the Jeffrey Cheah Foundation (JCF); co-organised by the Jeffrey Sachs Center on Sustainable Development; Jeffrey Cheah Institute on Southeast Asia (JCI), Pulau Banding Foundation, UKM's Lestari and hosted by Sunway University to formulate a regional mechanism to implement the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in Southeast Asia.

Among the ministers in attendance at the two-day ASEAN Ministers Workshop 2017 (AMW) were Datuk Seri Abdul Rahman Dahlan (Minister in the Prime Minister's Department, Malaysia); Dr Bambang Brodjonegoro, Minister of National Development Planning, Indonesia, and Saleumxay Kommasith, Minister of Foreign Affairs, Lao PDR.



In his welcome speech, Tan Sri Dr Ramon Navaratnam, Pro-Chancellor of Sunway University, emphasised the important role corporates and SMEs play in supporting sustainable development, "because it will benefit their businesses in the future". He cited that it is in their best interest to support sustainable development as it will benefit their businesses in the future.

"This first AMW will be the catalyst of an annual highlevel event for ASEAN ministers to meet, discuss and work towards achieving the SDGs for the region," said Professor Woo Wing Thye, Chair, AMW Organising Committee and Director of Jeffrey Sachs Center on Sustainable Development, Sunway University. "The Jeffrey Sachs Center on Sustainable Development (JSC) is committed to support the UN's blueprint for ending poverty in the world in the context of sustainable development and building a sustainable future for all."

With three plenary discussions focused on ASEAN Experience, the Australian Experience and the Action Items for Southeast Asia, the workshop also included a public lecture by Professor Jeffrey Sachs, Chairman of JSC and a dialogue with the attending ASEAN ministers.

Sachs spoke about the important role universities play in helping ASEAN countries attain the SDGs. From the development of deep excellence in science, technology, engineering and areas essential to supporting sustainable policy development, Sachs urged universities to be incubators for SDG start-ups.

During the plenary discussion on "Implementing SDGs: The ASEAN Experience", keynote speaker Datuk Seri Abdul Rahman Dahlan spoke of Malaysia's commitment to adopting the 2030 Agenda on Sustainable Development via the 11th



Malaysia Plan (2016 to 2020). He said he looked forward to getting everyone to work together to make the world a better place, and shared Malaysia's willingness to work with regional and international partners towards making the 17 SDGs a reality.

Among those who participated in the workshop were Rosemarie Edillon, Undersecretary of the National Development Office for Policy and Planning, National Economic and Development Authority, Philippines, Somkiat Triratpan, Secretary to the Minister attached to the Prime Minister's Office, Thailand, and Philip Green, First Assistant Secretary, Southeast Asia Mainland and Regional Division, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Australia.
